# 2020 MLK DAY OF SERVICE

To honor the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and his dedication to service, the FAMU NAA annually challenges individual chapters to commit to a community service project in the local area. This year, the Miami-Dade Chapter chose to collaborate with the Sickle Cell Association - Miami-Dade Chapter and the University of Miami Sickle Cell Center to provide personal hygiene products, activity books, and other FAMU mementos to the patients at Jackson Memorial Hospital. Many patients, particularly the children and young adults, did not have any basic hygiene products other than the bare minimum that the hospital provides.

Chapter members were able to donate several items including lotions, socks, toothbrushes, toothpaste, cotton swabs, deodorants, disposable wipes, and more. There were enough items to fill over 50 bags to distribute to the patients. Vice-President Miranda Albury delivered the bags to Alex's Place, the Childhood Cancer and Blood Disorders clinic. The patients were excited to receive the supplies and Chapter members were delighted to contribute.

Sickle cell anemia is a blood disorder that affects many, but African-Americans are at a greater risk at contracting the illness. Several Chapter members know someone that deals with the challenges of sickle cell. There was a consensus within the Chapter to continue supporting this community service effort and to make sickle cell awareness a targeted focus going forward. September is Sickle Cell Awareness Month.

### HISTORY RE-EMERGING ARE YOU READY FOR THE ORANGE BLOSSOM CLASSIC?

**JASON MOODY** - Rattlers far and near are excitedly awaiting the return of the historic Orange Blossom Classic back in its home spot here in Miami.

First founded in 1933 by J.R.E. Lee Jr. (son of President J.R.E. Lee) as a post season invitational game, its legacy is still held in high regard by Rattler football fans. Starting the tradition in Jacksonville, FL against Howard with 2,000 fans in attendance, the Orange Blossom Classic found its home and history in Miami in 1947. In 1947 at the Orange Bowl stadium, black fans were able to sit in the main stands for the first time in order to witness the "must-see" black college football game. With the last Classic game being held in 1978 against Grambling State, there have been no games scheduled until now in 2020.

The re-emergence of the Orange Blossom Classic will be held in the beautiful city of Miami Gardens during Labor Day Weekend on Sept 6, 2020 at Hard Rock Stadium. FAMU will be playing against Albany State University at 7 pm EST. The Orange Blossom Classic is expecting to bring out alumni, students, and fans of the HBCU experience with hopes in gathering scholarship funds for the participating schools. With the re-emergence of the Classic, the importance of history and tradition regarding HBCUs will be put on full display for all to see.






#### A Tribute to Eugene Bragg

2020 FAMU DAY AT THE CAPITOL

On February 6, the annual FAMU Day at the Capitol was held in Tallahassee. This marquee event is meant to convey to our local representatives the importance of FAMU's legislative budget requests. Chapter President Masekela Mandela was able to make the trip up to Tallahassee and meet with Rattlers from across the state. Dr. Carolyn Collins, past NAA President and current Governmental Relations chair, greeted everyone to remind them of the importance of the day. SBI Dean / FAMU Foundation Executive Director Dr. Shawnta Friday-Stroud, NAA President Col. Greg Clark and University President Dr. Larry Robinson also brought greetings and led the Rattlers to the Capitol building.

The FAMU SGA prepared students to speak with legislative officials. Students were ready to provide first-hand anecdotal references to support the budget requests. For example, continued support for building infrastructure was a priority to speak about and students could mention how certain buildings had been largely unchanged since their parents were at FAMU. They were amiable yet professional – perfect examples of FAMU excellence. President Mandela led the conversation during meetings with legislative aides but allowed dialogue to continue naturally by encouraging the students to speak about their experiences. Bad weather ended the day prematurely, but Rattler spirits were high upon departure.
