

Keep pedaling! Delroy Forever!








Probably one of the most misunderstood holidays on the calendar, Kwanzaa is often mired in mystery, mischaracterized as a religious holiday or as a celebration for the ultra "woke" crowd. While Kwanzaa does have pan-African roots (hinted by the black, red, and green colors) it can be described as an African-American focused holiday that reflects on the African ancestral past, the present, the future descendants that will carry on their respective legacies, and the principles that are meant to guide life accordingly.

Founded by Dr. Maulana Karenga in 1966, Kwanzaa is derived from the Swahili term *matunda ya kwanza*, a phrase that that means "first fruits". First fruit festivals are celebrated by many groups in southern Africa. These events traditionally marked a time of prosperity during the harvest seasons. Though originally created as a Christmas alternative, Dr. Karenga changed his position so that it could be embraced by all faiths – in fact many that celebrate Kwanzaa also celebrate Christmas.





Probably the most notable symbol of Kwanzaa is the kinara, the candle holder that holds seven candles. The seven candles are representative of the seven life principles that are celebrated each of the seven days of the holiday. One candle is lit each day, starting with the black (Unity) candle and then alternating red and green until all of the candles are lit on the seventh day. These principles are not mutually exclusive and are to be used in combination to craft a fulfilling life. The principles are as follows:

December 26 - UMOJA - Unity

December 27 - KUJICHAGULIA - Self-Determination

December 28 - UJIMA - Collective Work & Responsibility

December 29 - UJAMMA - Cooperative Economics

December 30 - NIA - Purpose

December 31 - KUUMBA - Creativity

January 1 - IMANI - Faith


